

Freight Class Key Facts

- Freight class is an industry-wide system used to categorize commodities.
- Classes are defined by the National Motor Freight Traffic Association (NMFTA).
- There are 18 distinct freight classes ranging from Class 50 to Class 500.
- Classes are based upon four characteristics: density, stowability, handling and liability.




What factors determine freight classification?



NMFC Codes Key Facts

- National Motor Freight Classification (NMFC) codes identify very specific commodities.
- "Bricks," "maple syrup" and every other LTLshippable product has a unique NMFC code.
- Each of these codes corresponds with and are aligned to one of the 18 freight classifications.
- NMFC codes/commodities are assigned to a freight class based upon density and shipping difficulty.





What do they mean together?

FREIGHT CLASSES represent **criteria** or **a standard** based

NMFC CODES represent commodities that are assigned a class

upon four variables of shipping difficulty.

depending on their shipability.

- When together on a bill of lading, the two allow shippers and carriers to evaluate pricing.
- Using both allows everyone to "speak the same language" when it comes to freight costs.
